


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
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

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THE

PREFACE:

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Antiquity of Singing PSALMS and HYMNS; with an Account of this Book, and the Use thereof.

HE Praising of GOD by Pfalms and Hymns, as it feems a part of Natural Religion owned and used by all Mankind, fo we find the Practice of it very early in the Church of There can be no just caufe to doubt, but that it God. was at leaft contemporary with Inftrumental Mufick; a thing as ancient as the Times of Adam, invented by Jubal, who was the Father of all fach as handle the Harp and Organ, Gen. 4, 21. But we need not build upon Conjectures, where we have clear Evidence. After the famous Deliverance which God gave the Ifraelites at the Red-Sea, they celebrated the Mercy with a Song of Triumph; and Jof phus fays, They fpent the whole night in Hymns and Mirth : Then lang Mofes and the children of if ael this Jong unto the Lord, Exod. 15. 1. which is there upon Record, composed (as Josephus adds) in Hexameter Verse; and that it was conjoyned with Instrumental Musick is plain, verf. 20, 21. And Miriam the prophetels, the fifter of Aaron, took a timbrel in her hand, and all the momen went cut after her with timbrels and with dances: And Miriam answered them, Sing ye to the Lord, for he bath triumphed gloriously, &c. But the first that established singing Plalms and Hymns, as a fix'd and conftant part of God's publick Worthip in the folemn Affemblies of the Tewift Church, was King David; whole zeal for God's Glory (before the House of God was built) fet himself to compose divers Plalms for that fervice, as we read in 1 Chron. 16. 7. and ch. 25. v. 6, 7. and to chufe out Men skilful in Song to perform the fame to the praife of Almighty God. When his Son Salomon had finished the Temple, at the Dedication thereof, you may read in 2 Chron. 5. 12, 13, 14. how the Prailes of the Lord were founded forth with Voices and Inffruments, and also how acceptable is was to the Lord. This being established, the Priests and Levites con-

tinued this folemn Worship during the time of the First and Second Temple, even till the Destruction thereof, foretold by our bleffed Saviour, who faw the Glory thereof, and frequented that place, as he acknowledgeth, Luke 22. 53. I was daily with you in the Temple. And (as a Learned Divine observes) it is not credible, that our bleffed Saviour, who so often quoted David's Pfalms for the confirmation of his Doctrine, would neglect that part of Worship then in force, and who did himself fay, That it became him to fulfil all righteousses; which he further testfied, when together with his Disciples he fung a Psalm or Hymn at the end of the Celebration of his Last Supper. After his Ascension, his Difciples gave testimony of their Approbation, Acts 2.46,47. They were daily with one accord in the temple praising God, &c. And Acts 3. I. mentions, that Peter and John went up together into the temple at the boar of prayer; which was the fet time for the Celebration of publick Worship.

The Ufe of Singing Pfalms and Hymns was continued with great Reverence and Devotion among the Primitive Christians; those who confult the Writings of the Primitive Fathers, shall fearce meet with one that makes not mention thereof. An account hereof I find learnedly discoursed by Dr. Cave in his Primitive Christianity, Part 1. p. 276, 277. where, speaking of reading the appointed Lessons, he hath these words: About this part of the Service it was that they fing Hymns and Pfalms, a tonsiderable part of the Divine Worship, (as it had ever been accounted both among h Jews and Gentiles) and more immediately serviceable for Celebrating the Honour of God, and lifting up the Minds of Men to Divine and Heavenly Raptures.

But to come nearer our Times: In our late Forefathers days, (upon the Reflauration of our Church to its Primitive Purity and Difcipline) it was, That fome holy and godly Men brought the prefent use and manner of finging Pfalms into the Publick Service of our Church, following berein the Examples of the Reformed Churches in France and Germany: But Time and long Use hath much abared the wonted Reverence and Effimation it had for about 100 Years after this Establishment. It was the Saying of a Learned Divine in his Sermon on this Subject, That Prayer *jball cease, and* Preaching *fball cease, but* Praising of GOD *fball never cease, neither in this world, nor in that which is to come.* To fing Praises to God, is an Angelic Office; it is a tafte of the First Fruits of Heaven while we are on Earth. MUSICK (the Learned fay) is the Handmaid to Divinity; and there is no Science, except That, admitted into the Service of the Church.

To conclude; I have made it my Endeavour fo to perfect and finish this Work, that nothing should be wanting to render it useful to the End it is deligned, The Glory of GOD, and the Publick Service of the Church: And for that reason, (with the Judgment of some of the best skill'd in Musick) I have Composed all the Musical Tunes into Three Parts, viz. Contur, Medico, and Bassaria: The Church Tune is placed in the Treble

Part, (which is the Cantus,) with the Bass under it, as most proper to joyn Voice and Instrument together, according to holy David's prefcription, Pfal. 144.9. And fince many of our Churches are lately furnished with Organs, it will also be useful for the Organist; and likewise for fuch Students in the Universities as shall practife Song, to fing to a Lute or Viol. The Medius Part is composed (as is proper) not to rife above the Church Tune, to cloud or obfcure the Ayre thereof, except in fuch places as it could not be well avoided. The Bafs is composed in fuch a compass of Notes, as will fute an indifferent Voice both below and above. All Three Parts may as properly be fung by Men, as by Boys or Women : And to that end, the two Upper Parts are conftant in the G fol re ut Cliff, and the Bafs in the F faut (its proper) Cliff; all Three Parts moving together in Solemn way of Counterpoint, and alfe every Tune put in fuch Keys as is most futable to the Ayre thereof. Laftly, you will find every Pfalm fitted to Tunes futable and proper to the Matter: Pfalms of Prayer and Confession, to folemn grave Flat Tunes; Pfalms of Thankfgiving and Praife, to lively chearful Sharp Tunes. Likewife all fuch Pfalms and Hymns whofe Tunes are long, and may feen difficult to fome, have Directions over them to be fung to other fhort Common Tunes. Also there is affixed before the Book, a Table of the first Line of the Treble-Tunes of all the Pfalms, with the Names alphabetically fet over each Tune; and under, what Pfalms are fung to them: And a Table of Hymns in a Page by themfelves. As for Instructions to the Singing of them, I refer you to my Introduction to the Skill of Musick, in 8º.

I have no more to add, but as the Glory of GOD, and the Service of . his Church, was my fole End and Aim; fo I shall account my Labour and Pains herein sufficiently recompensed, if it prove Useful to such as so endeavour to fing the Praises of their Creator here on Earth in Pfalms and Hymns, that hereafter they may eternally fing Hallelujaks among the bleffed Choir of Saints and Angels. Of the Virtue and Efficacy of the PSALMS.

IN the Pfalms are defcribed the rewards of good, the punifhments of evil men, the rudiments of beginners, the progrefs of proficients, and confummation of perfect men.

The Singing of Plalms comforteth the forrowful, pacifieth the angry, firengtheneth the weak, humbleth the proud, gladdeth the humble, firreth up the flow, reconcileth enemies, lifteth up the heart to heavenly things, and uniteth the Creature to his Creator; for whatloever is in the Plalms, conduceth to the edification, benefit, and confelation of mankind.

If thou would'ft make a confession, and repent thee of thy fins; then with remorfe and humility fing the 7 Penitential Pfalms of David, viz. Pfal.6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, 143. and thou shalt feel the fweet mercies of God, and thy mind refreshed with spiritual joy.

If thou would it pray; then pour forth thy foul in Plal. 25, 54, 67,70, 72,86,143. for the foul of man cannot either feelingly express its milery, tribulation, and anguish of temptation, or more powerfully call upon the mercy of God, than in these Plalms.

If thou would'ft praife the Majesty of God, or give him thanks for all his benefits; then fing Pfal. 103, 104, 105, 106, 107, 108, 111, 113, 144, 145, 146, 147, 148, 149, 150.

If thou art fo far afflicted with outward and inward temptations, that thou feemeft to be forfaken; then fing heartily Pfal. 22, 64, 69.

If this prefent life betedious unto thee, and that with an ardent defire thou waitest to see God; then sing Pfal. 42, 63, 84.

If thou find thy felf quite dejected, and (as it were) forlorn in trouble; then with compunction of heart fing Pfal. 13, 31, 44, 54, 56. And if thou hast found ease and rest unto thy foul, then sing to the praise of God Pfal. 30, 34, 103, 104. And always (whether in time of *adversity* or *prosperity*) sing out the Song of the 3 hely Children, wherein every creature is invited to praise God.

If thou defireft to exercise thy felf in God's divine praises and precepts; then sing Pfal. 119. wherein if thou fearch even all thou canft, yet thou wilt never perfectly understand the virtues and excellencies, or reach to the heights and depths comprehended in it; for hardly is there a Verse, wherein is not mention made of God's Law, Commandments, Testimonies, or Precepts.

In a word, he that gives these heavenly Hymns their due, had need to compose a Pfalm in praise of the Pfalms, that so the devout and joyful soul inight, with looking up to God, reflect upon its own work, and transport it felf unto the Choir of Angels and Saints, whose perpetual task is to sing their concording Parts without pause, redoubling and descanting, Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of Hosts. And if Vocal Musick be not enough, letthe Instrumental be added, Rev. 15. 2, 3. They have in their hands the harps of God, and sing the song of Moses, and the song of the Lamb, saying, Great and marvellous are thy works, Lord God Almighty. Amen.
