Such as the Father is, fuch is the Sonne in each degree: And fuch alfo vece doe beeleeue, the holy Ghoft to bee. Vncreate is the Father, and vncreate is the Sonne: The holy Ghoft vncreate, fo vncreate is each one.

Incomprehenfible Father is, -incomprehenfible Some; Incomprehenfible allo is, the holy cholt of none. The Father is cternall, and the Some cternall fo: And in like fort eternall is, the holy gholt alfo. And yet though we beleeue that each, of thefe eternall bee : Yet there but one eternall is, and not eternalls three. As ue incomprehenfible wee, ne yet wareate thee : But one incomprehenfible, one

vncrcate hold to bee.

Almightie fo the Father is, the Sonre almightie fo: And in like fort almightie is the holy Ghoft alfo. And albeit that euery one, of thefe Almightie bee: Yet there but one Almightie is, and not Almighties three.
