This section shows the beginning of the piece. The Flauto part consists of sustained notes. The Violino part has eighth-note patterns with grace notes. The Forte-Piano part provides harmonic support with sustained chords. Measure 8 concludes with a repeat sign and two endings.

This section begins with the Violino taking a more prominent role, playing eighth-note patterns with grace notes. The Forte-Piano part continues to provide harmonic support with sustained chords. Measures 17 and 18 conclude with repeat signs and endings.

This section continues with the Violino's eighth-note patterns and grace notes. The Forte-Piano part maintains its harmonic function. Measures 26 and 27 conclude with repeat signs and endings.

26

This section concludes the piece with the Violino's eighth-note patterns and grace notes. The Forte-Piano part provides the final harmonic closure. Measures 34 and 35 conclude with a final ending.



Critical notes

This score is the first modern edition of “Walzer für Fortepiano, Violino & Flöte”, G.10, for flute, violin and piano by the Danish composer Georg Gerson (1790–1825). Composed in Hamburg 1807

The source is:

MS “Partiturer No. 1”, “George Gersons samling: mu 7105.0963 C II, 6b” (1823), a collection of manuscript scores by Gerson preserved at the Royal Library of Copenhagen, Denmark. The score is found on pp. 31–32.

According his own thematic catalogue, “Verzeichniß über Zwei Hundert meiner Compositionen”¹ Gerson wrote the waltz for Adelaide Nathanael (1796–1891) who became his wife for a few months before he died in 1825.
